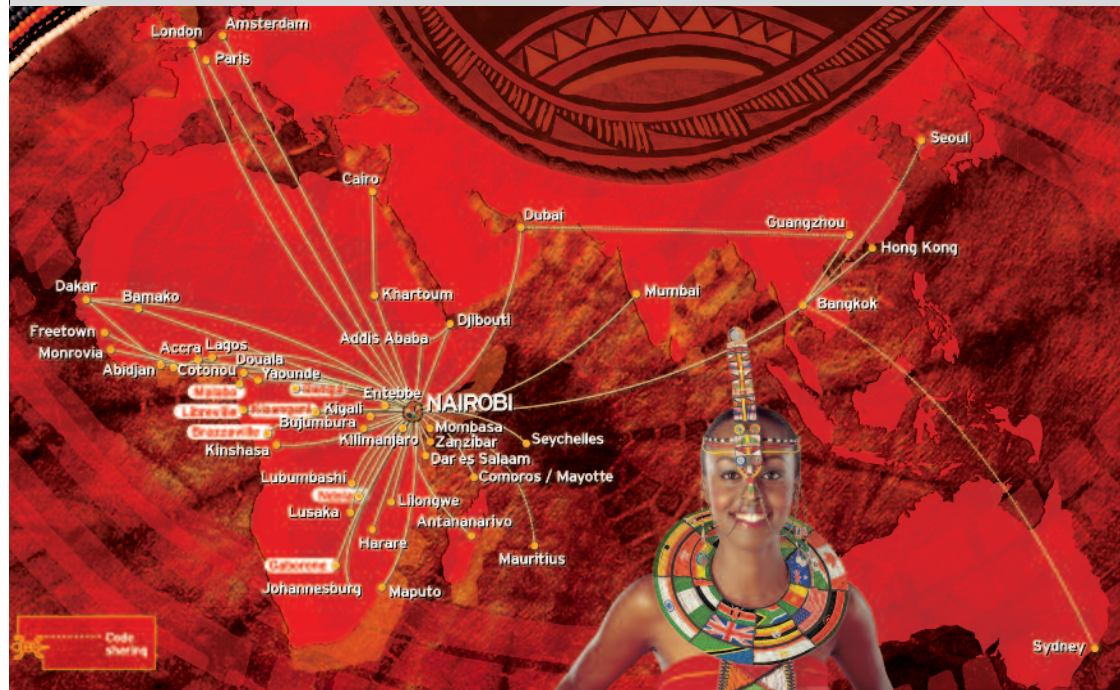

To back up the ambitious route expansion plans and improve the quality of service delivered to its customers, Kenya Airways has also embarked on comprehensive new training programmes for its staff at its Pride Centre. The airline currently has a workforce of over 4,200 employees of which more than 340 are pilots in charge of over 130 flights every day.

Kenya Airways recently signed a Code Share Agreement with Nigerian Eagle Airlines to strengthen its presence and increase market share in West Africa. The agreement offers customers of the two airlines extended travel and better connection options in West, East and Southern Africa. The deal also enables Nigerian Eagle Airlines passengers to connect to Africa and the world through the Kenya Airways hub at JKIA and demonstrates that African carriers are co-operating more than ever before to develop aviation transport.

Very soon, Kenya Airways plans to fly to Jeddah in Saudi Arabia, Juba in Southern Sudan, Ouagadougou in Burkina Faso and Luanda in Angola opening up more opportunities for Africa to grow.

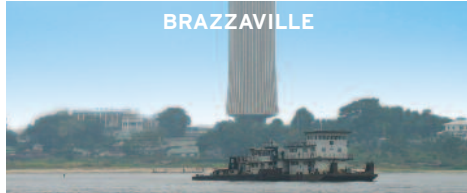

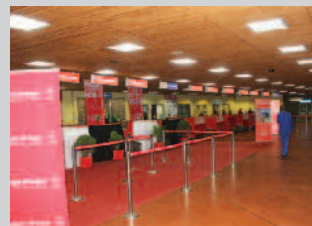
